technical language of planners. He proposed that development plans should be written in such a manner that a majority of the people can understand. Shri Sanjay Kumar, also released the colourful souvenir printed on this occasion comprising messages of the dignitaries besides some technical papers.

Shri Swayam Choudhary, CEO, Imagine Panaji Smart City, in his key note address stated that industrial revolution has created the challenge of greenhouse gases, while use of fossil fuels in transportation generated more carbon dioxide which has exposed cities to the climate change. In fact cities are facing the impact of climate change due the ever increasing population, and consumption of already depleting resources also increases. Yet another big challenge is the production of unprecedented amount of wastes. How we deal and manage the solid wastes is also threatening local bodies and city authorities to collect, transport and dispose of the wastes, both liquid and solid. Among the extreme challenge of hunger, we are also experiencing the wastage of food. Goa with 60 percent of urbanization rate is also experiencing dwindling mining and tourism activities and facing the challenge of updating and upgrading the infrastructure while resilience and sustainability remains unattended.

Prof. Dr. D. S. Meshram, President, ITPI, in his presidential address mentioned that climate change generally refers to the change in averages and extremes in the climate of a region over time. It is measured by changes in temperature, precipitation, wind, storm and other whether indicators. It has been predicted that the climate change is likely to increase the frequency, intensity and duration of extreme events in unpredictable ways and will require cities to adapt strategies that enable decision makers to manage the variabilities and uncertainties. The heat waves also play a major role in the climate change specifically its frequency and power. In India during 2019, the temperature rose to 50.6 degree Celsius and 36 people died. Rise in temperature takes place due to melting of the glaciers which ultimately result in the rise of sea level, threatening the very existence of low lying coastal settlements. Indian climate regions range from tropical to temperate climate in south and alpine in north Himalaya creating snow fall.

Global warming is also the after effect of climate change which rises in average surface temperature on earth and gases such as carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gases due to the use of fossil fuels. In India the percent level of pollution noticed amounts to 51 percent caused by industries; 27 percent caused by vehicles; 8 percent by burning of crops; and 5 percent by fireworks. As a consequence, 2 million people die prematurely every year in India, which calls for adopting sustainable planning and development strategies to mitigate the challenge of climate change. He also raised the important question: are our cities sustainable?

The climate change scenarios projected by the Ministry of Environment and Forest, Government of India indicates that by 2030 net increase in annual temperature with respect to 1970, will change between $1.7 - 2.2^{\circ}$ C with extreme temperature

increasing by 1.4°C, with maximum increase in coastal regions. Sea level along Indian coasts will also rise in consonance with global sea level rise, and change is also projected in forest sector or vegetation. He called on the planners to plan climate change resilient cities and also to adopt disaster risk reduction measures. He also referred to the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) to which India is also signatory, which contain 17 SDGs with 169 targets and are based on the principles of 'leave no one behind'. In fact SDG-11 focuses on making cities and human settlements inclusive, safe, resilient, and sustainable.

In the inaugural session welcome address was delivered by Shri Pradeep Kapoor, Secretary General, ITPI and a vote of thanks was extended by Shri James Mathew, Chairman, Goa Regional Chapter.

The Technical Session – I was chaired by Prof. Dr. D. S. Meshram in which presentations were made by Prof. Dr. Saswat Bandopadhyay, CEPT University, Ahmedabad, on 'Climate Resilient Planning Framework for Indian Cities', and also by Shri Saurav Choudhary from IGBC on 'Green Cities'.

The Technical Session – II was chaired by Prof. E. F. N. Ribeiro, former President, ITPI, in which presentations were made by Ms. Namrata Kashyap, Town Planner, on the theme 'City Level Policy Guidelines to Mitigate Climate Change Effects' and also by Shri Sujeet Kumar Dongre, Scientist, CEE on 'Coastal Zone Management Plan, Goa'.

The Technical Session – III was chaired by Shri K. S. Akode, former President, ITPI, in which presentations were made by Shri Pradip Sarmokadam, Member Secretary, Goa Biodiversity Board, on 'Importance of Planning in dealing with Climate Change' and by Shri Digvijay Desai, GWMC on 'Implementation of Waste Management Rules in Goa'. Both speakers stressed that the task of planning in present scenario of climate change is very challenging, including waste management specifically for small towns, which not only requires foresight but also actions on ground within the parameters of prevailing rules and regulations. He also raised the issue of bringing into fold unplanned towns because nobody would like to live in unplanned towns, and this calls for improving the quality of life in small and medium towns.

In his Valedictory address Shri J. Ashok Kumar, IAS, Secretary, Health and Sports, Government of Goa, sharing his experience of planning and waste management noted that these are very challenging issues and need to be addressed with sensitivity. To clarify his point he quoted the example of Lakshadweep where infrastructure of any kind was not in place for collection, conveyance and disposal of solid wastes as even vehicles were not available. Use of plastics in a daily life was a big challenge not only for planners but also for policy makers and managers in urban areas as most of it is nondegradable. He also emphasised the fact that we should decrease the production of wastes and also recycle the wastes particularly those that are not degradable. The segregation of drv and liquid wastes should be segregated at household level, which would ease the task of solid waste disposal. He then underlined the challenges of waste produced due to building construction and called on the planners to enforce the ECBC and green building norms so as to reduce the pollution to mitigate the challenge of climate change.

Shri Sanjit Rodrigues, Commissioner, CCP, in his address pointed out that practices of town planning and waste management require foresightedness and of course the will to enforce rules and regulations for making our towns and cities sustainable. The provision of landfill sites for disposal of wastes is required to be made in the development plan as nobody wants the collection of waste sites next to their houses i.e. 'not in my backyard'. Where will waste be dumped? This question remains answered.

Prof. Dr. D. S. Meshram. President. ITPI in his concluding remarks highlighted that the increase in population in towns and cities beyond its bearing capacity demand provision of more infrastructure in addition to update and upgrade both in terms of quality and quantity. However, at the same time, resources are very limited. Therefore, there is a need to achieve a balance between consumption and conservation of available resources, which calls for sustainable development. He also mentioned that the use of plastics has also increased substantially in our daily life resulting in increasing the proportion of plastic content in the garbage, which we produce. Therefore, it would be more appropriate to recycle the plastic wastes. Lest, it gets dumped in landfill sites or ends up polluting streams or ground water resources. While concluding he underlined that plastic waste directly or indirectly affected living organisms, including marine life. So, it is pertinent to reduce the use of plastic in our daily life.

In the Valedictory Session, the welcome address was delivered by James Mathew, Chairman, Goa Regional Chapter and at the close of the Session the vote of thanks was extended by Shri Vinod Kumar, Secretary, Goa Regional Chapter.




ITPI WEBINAR PART-I 'Post Covid-19: Planning of Cities and Towns'

The ITPI organized webinar series part – I starting on 2 May 2020 on the theme 'Post Covid- 19: Planning of Cities and Towns'. The key speakers were Prof. Dr. Ashok Kumar, Professor, SPA, Delhi, Prof. Dr. Subrata Chattopadhyay, Professor, I.I.T., Kharagpur; Prof. Shivanand Swami, Professor, CEPT University, Ahmedabad; and Prof. K. K. Pandey, Professor, IIPA, New Delhi.

Shri Pradeep Kapoor, Secretary General, ITPI giving the background of the webinar mentioned that last a community, population or region, but a pandemic is an epidemic that is spread over multiple countries or continents. Thus, the effect of pandemic is widespread. Therefore there is a need to reorient our polices and strategies for planning and development of our towns and cities in the mist of Covid-19. This webinar is part-I of the series, which will be followed by inviting the professionals and other experts subsequently.

In his introduction Prof. Dr. D. S. Meshram, President, ITPI mentioned that in recently held 68th National Town



official pandemic took place in 2009 and caused an outbreak of H1V1 virus, commonly called as 'Swine Flu'. In recent history, HIV and AIDS pandemic at its peak killed 36 million people during 2005-2012. In fact pandemic is the worldwide spread of a new disease, according to the WHO, while the epidemic is a disease that affects a large number of people within and Country Planners, Conference at Navi - Mumbai on the theme 'Spatial Planning and Implementation Strategies' delegates recommended development of compact and dense cities in order to utilize less land for urban development, which is a scarce commodity. However, in the present day scenario, we are confined to our homes due to lock down in order to observe social distancing. In this prevailing situation, the issue arises as to how much our towns and cities be dense or compact. In addition whether the prevailing norms and standards still holds good or require revision. Besides, planning polices in terms of housing, traffic and transportation, physical and social infrastructure, trade and commerce, open spaces also require to be revisited. For example, in mass transportation by rail and buses people struggle to enter, and then struggle to get out. The question is how much mass transportation should be promoted for mass travel. With reference to personalized vehicles, earlier we argued that vehicle should carry full capacity of passengers, and now we are concerned about how to observe physical distancing.

Safety us an essential element of mobility, howeverr during Covid-19 when traffic has reduced on the roads the driver gets tempted to increase the speed which may result into accidents. He has also highlighted that in order to observe social distancing people may start using their personal vehicles, increasing traffic on the roads. Our bazars and mandies, are overcrowded then how to observe physical distancing?. This also holds good for public spaces, which will be crowded if social distancing is to be observed. People also advise to wash hands with soap frequently, which is not possible in slum areas, where water is available only for few hours and not even sufficient for drinking purposes. Therefore, we have to weigh not only the direct effects of Covid-19, but also its side effects. If we talk about compact cities, how much compact or dense it should be? How much density we should increase or take into consideration for maintaining physical distancing? In case we have to provide more space, may be horizontal or vertical, then how to reduce costs. All these challenges are required to be addressed by city planners.

Prof. Dr. Subrata Chattopadhyay spoke on the theme 'Post Covid-19 Housing Policy'. He said that historical evidence shows devastating impact of outbreak of epidemics on cities, towns, built environment and housing. Therefore, contemporary post-Covid-19 housing policies should adopt special measures during lock down. Currently, poorly designed and overcrowded dwelling units pose the biggest threat with 14 million households living in urban slums under unliveable conditions with no scope for physical distancing. Socio-economic inequalities are increasing in many places due to enhancing income inequality, economic vulnerability translating to poorer health outcomes; environmental injustices like living near incinerators, landfills, etc. leading to lung inflammations. There is no space in homes to isolate ill persons due to lack of space. Physical distancing is a myth in slums considering congestion factor because only 20 percent of dwelling units in a

slum have a plinth area of more than 50 sq m and per capita floor area available in a slums could be as low as 4.6 sq m. They also have limited access to water for hand washing. Prof. Dr. Subrata Chattopadhyay further mentioned that in slum areas one tap is available for a number of people, and the quantity is also insufficient for drinking purposes. He therefore suggested carrying removable taps.

Prof. Dr. Ashok Kumar focused his presentation on the theme 'Post Covid-19: Inclusive Planning and Development' in the context of SDG-6 and SDG-11. In his presentation, he argued that during Covid-19 pandemic everyone is not suffering equally, the urban poor and people working in the informal sector are suffering more. Prof. Ashok Kumar explained that three million people were locked down within four hours, and markets and commercial establishments were shut down, bringing the economy of the country to a complete halt. One thing that became clear was the fact that it is not the markets which control the economy of the country; rather it is government which remains all pervasive and extremely powerful. The myth of the market was shattered by the state. He further argued that decision makers requiring the poor to wash their hands frequently are not a pragmatic strategy without first making water available to them. How do policy makers expect urban poor to frequently wash their hands when water is supplied infrequently and only for half an hour? The urban poor have to make a choice, whether they should store water for drinking purposes or use water for cleaning hands. The poor face this diabolical dilemma. Besides as the . community water taps works only for one hour, and a number of people gather to get water, under such circumstances, it is impossible to observe physical distancing. Physical distancing is also not possible in case an urban poor gets infected and needs to be isolated because the size of a *jhuggi* may not be more than about 50 sq m. So, the urban poor are disproportionately badly affected by COVID-19 as it happens in any and every pandemic.

Prof. Shivanand Swamy dwelt on the theme 'Post Covid-19: Mass Transportation'. He said that spread out cities create more challenges. If we follow physical distancing, the capacity would come to half, that is to say reduced ridership. Who will bear the costs, he asked? In the prevailing circumstances, the question also arises whether metros and light rail, etc., would be viable? Due to lock down, it is said that people will work from home, does it mean that people will not move at all. He argued that people need to move for other purposes. He also stressed that causalities are not higher in high density areas, but more in low density areas. Thus, density is not the



problem but norms and standards are the problem. Therefore, he suggested revisiting the prevailing norms and standards, to address the requirements of the challenges of Covid-19. He also suggested that there is a need to prepare 'mobility plans', which should be embedded in master plans. He was of the firm opinion that smart cities and towns need to be provided with more infrastructure, amenities and facilities, and should be connected with metro cities with high mobility networks.

Prof. Dr. K. K. Pandey deliberated on the subject 'Post – Covid – 19: Revival of Economy'. He observed that people are going back from urban areas to rural areas or to their villages from where they migrated and it is not known whether they will ever return to urban areas i.e. their work place. If yes, when will they return is also not certain? As they go back to their villages, they create pressure on provision of water and various activities, while the rural areas are already deficient in supply of drinking water. Therefore,

expecting them to clean their hands frequently with soap is not feasible. With reference to the supply of essential goods and provisions, he suggested to tap the supply chain near national highways. He also pointed out that inclusive growth also includes poor. He argued that 15 metropolitan cities do not have the capacity to absorb more people, and if the migrants return to these cities, it will be a challenge to these cities to provide for their livelihoods. Therefore, he suggested to tap 461 class-I towns, as the typology of migration is likely to change. He also highlighted the need for provision of rental housing to employees and migrants who are likely to return.

Presentations were followed by open house discussions. While extending a vote of thanks Shri Pradeep Kapoor, Secretary General, ITPI, noted that very fruitful and meaningful discussions and deliberations took place on this very important theme, and will be followed up in part - II of the webinar on the same subject.

ITPI WEBINAR PART-II 'Post Covid-19: Urban Planning'

Welcoming the key speakers and participants to the ITPI, webinar part - II, Shri Pradeep Kapoor, Secretary General, ITPI noted that in Part - I webinar all the four key speaker were educationists. Today on 9 May 2020, there are four key speakers out of which three are expert in the preparation and implementation development plans and the fourth key speaker is a professor SAP, AMITY University, Chhattisgarh. He further mentioned that the theme of the webinar 'Post Covid- 19: Urban Planning' assumes importance because it is the first pandemic after globalization. Thereafter, he requested all the key speakers to share their views as to how they intend to address the Covid – 19 situation, not only in plan preparation but also in plan implementation and enforcement.

Ms. Leenu Sehgal, Commissioner (Planning), Delhi Development Authority (DDA), who is spearheading the Master Plan Delhi, 2041, began by saying that the epidemics and pandemics ravaged the humanity throughout its existence, irrespective of race and region. With reference to Covid-19, she opined that not only low density areas have been affected but the high density areas of Delhi are also affected. She further highlighted that we generally prescribe space standards for dwelling units i.e. 25 to 32 sq m, but it was observed that some times 30 to 40 people also live in one room. Therefore, the endeavour

should be to prescribe per capita space to overcome this problem. Migration of people to Delhi was a common knowledge and now we are witnessing reverse migration, and people who have gone back to their villages may not come back to Delhi in the near future. She also advocated adoption of a mixed growth strategy comprising: economy + soil +environment while preparing development plans. She also called for public participation, which would not only ease pressure on city planners for the preparation of master plans but also for the implementation of plan proposals. She also underlined innovative solutions and technologies for plan implementation and enforcement, and called on planners to give their suggestion for Master Plan for Delhi, 2041, which is being prepared.

Ms. N. Usha, Additional Secretary (Technical), Member and Chief Planner, Chennai Metropolitan Development Authority (CMDA) in her presentation underlined the need to relook at cities in real contexts in terms of the key areas like density of population, reverse migration, mass transportation, e-governance and planning parameters. She also called on the planning community to focus their attention on affordable housing and public spaces, creating large urban parks and housing for migrant labourers. The vowels for new business in planning



should focus on adaptability, efficiency, inclusivity and opportunity. Due to huge demand for motorized transport, the widening of foot paths and cycle tracks get neglected, which is not only environment friendly mode of transport but also affordable for poor for short distance trips. She raised yet another issue for the consideration of not only planners, but also policy makers. She said that e-governance, which requires minimum or no interaction with physical presence and therefore this policy needs to be propagated to overcome the problem of physical distancing. She also brought into focus the aspect of digital public



offices and also digital education not only to avoid dependency on transport but is also a solution for observing physical distancing.

Ms. Uma Adusumilli, Chief Planning Division, Mumbai Metropolitan Region Development Authority (MMRDA), in her presentation highlighted adoption of the principle of walk to work and co-working, so that during Covid-19 situation, there is no need of lock down of offices. She also advocated reducing the dependence on motorized vehicles. Population density and clean air should be the major concerns during planning. Besides, we should decentralize jobs and entertainment centers to avoid concentration of more people at a given time at a given place. She also mentioned that Mumbai Metropolitan Region Development Authority is making efforts to decentralize core areas comprising of offices, markets, industries, etc. With reference to migration she has propagated development of small and medium towns as the metropolitan cities are attracting more population. She also suggested to have planned lock down may be on Sundays. Besides, it will also be advisable to impose lock down of total transport system on Sunday to stop the movement of people except for emergency services. She also recommended provisioning of facilities to migrant workers and no compromise should be made on amenity standards and development control rules. Towns and cities should not be seen as planned or developed in isolation of the region, rather it is appropriate in the prevailing situation to adopt regional planning concepts. With reference to transport oriented development (TOD), she argued its rationalization.

Dr. Manse Bal Bhargava, started her presentation by talking about building our cities in such a lock down situation is a big challenge to the planning community. She further elaborated that planning cannot be a problem solving exercise. Now we have to focus on new norms created only for the Covid-19 situation. She also noted that infrastructure we provide is not accessible to all strata of society. There is over provision of infrastructure in some areas, while no service is available in other areas. To make her point clear she quoted the example of Dharavi. Yet another point she brought into focus was building cities where we cannot take the car, and blame others for congestion. She emphasized on three H principle i.e. health, hygiene and happiness and propagated to have integrated land use planning. Stressing on the issue of provision of water, she said that water supply plan needs to be embedded in a development

plan, which at present is not receiving adequate attention of planners. She advocated bringing the value of land to zero. She also called on the planning community to bring blue-green revolution. With reference to observing physical distancing, she wanted policy makers to be pragmatic when it comes to the urban poor. On the issue of lock down due to Covid-19 pandemic, she noted that safety is more psychological than real.

Prof. Dr. D. S. Meshram, President, ITPI, while concluding the webinar noted that all the key speakers has made an elaborate presentations and covered, majority of emerging issues related to Covid-19 situation. He underlined that in our country for planned and orderly development of our towns and cities, we have adopted a system of preparation of development plans or master plans, which interalia prescribes norms and standards and development control regulations which hold good for the situation which was prevailing when these norms and standards were framed. Now due to Covid-19, we have to rethink new norms to observe social distancing. On the issue of reverse migration, he opioned that it is premature to mention that reverse migration has taken place, it is temporary phenomena, as soon as situation improves the migrated people will return, unless and until, the employment opportunities are provided in their villages or in the nearby small and medium towns. On the issue of Master Plan cannot be problem solving exercise, he clarified that we prepare the Plan to meet the requirements of the projected population for 20 to 25 years, however we cannot foresee the political compulsions, in between and therefore, Master Plan need to provide for such eventuality. To clarify his points he quoted the example of Common Wealth Games held in Delhi, due to which lakhs of service population migrated to Delhi, therefore, solutions to such challenges are required to be addressed in the Plan. On the issue of why we build cities where one cannot take his car, Dr. Meshram, opioned that cities are not built only for affluent people owning cars but also for masses who do not possess automobiles. Similarly on the issue of water he mentioned that water issues are invariably addressed in physical infrastructure chapter, in detail and water is also delt as a natural resource and natural feature in the concerned chapters. To clarify his point he quated the example of Delhi Master Plan.

Extending a vote of thanks to the key speakers and participants, Shri Pradeep Kapoor, Secretary General, ITPI, mentioned that this webinar will be followed up with Part - III.





Dr. D. S. Meshram, in his address mentioned that state of affairs of urban transport get aggravated by the ever increasing number of motor vehicles as compared to the availability of road space for their movement in the city. In addition to the availability of road space, the situation becomes much acute due to encroachments by pavement shops, pavement shelters, hawkers, parking of vehicles, and hoardings on the road, as the effective width of the road get reduced. Besides, the composition of traffic in our towns and cities is of mixed nature, comprising two, three, four wheelers motorised vehicles, which become more acute with mixing of animal driven vehicles and human powered vehicles. Besides, human beings is also move on roads in the absence

of foot paths which get encroached by hawkers. Thus, a better alternative is mass transportation.

Dr. D. S. Meshram, further advocated the use of nonmotorized transport (NMT), which is quite safe, as it mainly includes walking, cycling and cycle-rickshaws which are not only environment friendly but users friendly, infact it is the green mode of transport as their carbon foot print is low, energy consumption is minimal. As it is not using fossil fuel it is less expensive also, as compared to automobiles. And called on planners community to provide for these modes in their plans.



Prof. Dr. Sewa Ram, delivering the Talk

MAHARASHTRA REGIONAL CHAPTER, NAGPUR: Lecture Series-VII 'Environment Friendly Safe Mobility'



MRC (N) Lecture Series - VII 'Environment Friendly Safe Mobility' is in progress. Present on the dais are Prof. Dr. D. S. Meshram, President, ITPI on his left Prof. Dr. Sewa Ram, Professor SPA Delhi, and Shri Jagdish Rajurkar, Treasurer, MRC (N); on his right Shri Sujit Rodge, Chairman, MRC (N) and Prof. Dr. Pankaj Bahadure, Secretary MRC (N)

Shri Sujit Rodge, Chairman, MRC (N) while introducing the speaker mentioned that Prof. Dr. Sewa Ram, is a versatile speaker and is a professor in the Department of Transport Planning, School of Planning Architecture, New Delhi, who has been specifically invited to deliver a talk on the theme 'Environment Friendly Safe Mobility as a key to Achieving Sustainable Development Goals'.

Prof. Dr. Sewa Ram, in his presentation, emphasized that safety should be made the first priority, while planning and designing of traffic and transportation systems for any town. Through his presentation Dr. Sewa Ram, highlighted various aspects of traffic and transportation and elaborated safety aspects to be adopted during planning of cities. He advocated that non-motorized modes i.e. bicycle and rickshaws are better options for short trips in order to achieve sustainable development because they are not only environment friendly but also friendly to users.

Dr. Sewa Ram, also pointed out that congestion creates delay and delays create pollution. Everybody must have noticed that when the traffic moves with snails speed due to congestion, vehicles release extra

carbon dioxide which pollutes the environment. Every vehicle moving at less than 15 km per hour speed creates more pollution. People suggest that we should move to hybrid or electric vehicles in order to reduce pollution. He lamented that 82 percent of buyers of hybrid and electric vehicles already have one extra vehicle with them. Thus, this venture adds in the tally of number of vehicles. He therefore, advocated to use solar energy driven vehicles. He noted that movement traffic increases on the road, the speed decreases. In India 16 - 62 percent of the trips are by mass transport, 15 – 9 percent by bicycles and 37 – 28 percent are made by walk. While providing dedicated lanes for buses, cars, and two vehicles. planners need to be cautious as dedicated lanes for automobile vehicles tempts drivers to increase speed, which may lead to accidents. General tendency in India, is that if accident takes place, the authority provides sign boards, if again accidents take place then authorities provide speed barkers. But this is not an alternative to improving geometry of roads. What is required is changing the mind-set of the people. He was also of the opinion that safety on roads is very much related to visibility.

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
